To Change or Not To Change...THAT is the question!

Did you ever notice that expressions of "conventional wisdom" can sometimes be contradictory?

For example, one line of thinking indicates that "if it's not broken, then don't fix it."

This line of reasoning is based on the notion that if you mess with something that is not broken to start with, it may very well be broken when you finish messing with it. I well understand this because I (like many of you) was fortunate to have grown up during a time before computers. When I was a youngster, this meant that if I took something apart, I could usually see how the mechanism worked. Try that today and you'll just see a black box (computer) and still not know how the item actually works. Now the other part back then was that the item (which worked just fine before my curiosity caused me to take it apart) likely never worked again! If that was not bad enough, there was often tangible evidence of my efforts to be found in the fact that there were usually "extra" parts left over after the item was put back together! The clear lesson (which I continued to NOT learn throughout my younger years) was that if something is not broken, you should not try to fix it because by not fixing it, it will continue to not be broken.

Another way to say this is that you should not mess with success. That is, if something works well, for heaven's sake, leave it alone. Tamper with success and you run a great risk of altering that success in unknown ways. You may be taking something that is doing fine and changing it such that it can no longer be described as working well, regardless of your good intentions.

In contrast to the “if it’s not broken, don’t fix it” logic, there is another bit of wisdom that says, “he who rests rots”.

Or, if you stand still while others are moving ahead, you are losing ground. This thinking is based on the notion that you can't rest on yesterday's successes. Another way of saying this is that if you become complacent based on previous successes, you are setting yourself up for future problems.

So which line of thinking is right? Well, there is no clear answer. Often people try to find a mid-point between the two approaches. A good example of trying to find a happy medium can be found in automobile design. Automakers, especially in the era when our Studebakers were being produced, wanted to come up with a new look every year which had enough similarity with the previous models to help promote brand loyalty. Some of the best examples of the importance of this evolutionary approach can be found when an automaker did NOT follow that philosophy. Perhaps the two best examples are the Edsel and the mid-1930's Chrysler Air Flow cars. People were simply not ready for such a sudden change. In the case of Chrysler, they knew that streamlining was the coming trend, but their change was too abrupt for the public to accept. There was a question of whether the corporation could even withstand the storm of criticism that came their way. Many people unkindly referred to these cars as Air Flops instead of Air Flows!

The point of all this is, should our club stay as it is, or should we experiment with some changes? I am thinking here about our monthly get-togethers, but you might have other ideas as well.

To be clear, in my opinion there is ample evidence that there is a LOT right about what we are currently doing. We frequently get 45 or more folks attending our monthly meetings and sometimes many more than that. We have a good time and we get feedback that folks enjoy our monthly meetings. In fact, we have members who continue to be active even after they no longer own vehicles which trace their lineage back to South Bend. At the moment one of our members is selling their only Studebaker, but has given assurances that they will continue to be active.

However, I do wonder if from time to time we should try some meeting variations. For example, we may have members who would like to participate more, but cannot join us at 2 PM on Sundays. Realistically, we can't start our get-togethers before 2 PM on Sundays because we need to give folks time to get to our meeting after they attend church services. Having meetings on Saturdays would allow us to gather earlier in the day so we could have an activity before our meeting. Perhaps on occasion we could tour together (after all we are a “drivers” club) to a location and then have our meal and meeting after we all arrive together. Or maybe on occasion, we could have a tour to a location and have an overnight stay and then tour back together the next day. Once in a while we could have an activity jointly with another club. In the last year I've toured in Bullet (my 1951 Starlight Coupe) with other clubs and have been made to feel *very* welcome. These are just a few illustrative examples. You can likely think of many more options.

I invite all members to think about this and share their thoughts with me. That way, from time to time, we could try out different ideas.

As luck would have it, for a three-month period (this month as well as October and November) we will have Saturday meetings. In addition, thanks to the Delli's our November Meeting is scheduled to be a mystery tour. Personally I am looking forward to that!

I would really like to hear your thoughts about meetings or anything else you might have in mind. I am available by phone, email, mail, fax or even in person.

What do you think?

The Mailbox



From the Kitchen of Rich Knoblock:

Easy Swedish Meatballs

(One) 6 lb. bag of Casa Italian Style Meatballs, 5/8 ounce size (Sam's Club-freezer section)

(Three) 10 oz. cans of Campbell's beef gravy

(Three) 10 oz. cans Campbell's condensed cream of mushroom soup

(One) 16 oz. container sour cream

Salt, pepper, onion powder (to taste)

Large oval crock pot

Mix all ingredients, except meatballs, in a large bowl until combined. Place half the frozen meatballs in the crock pot. Pour the mixture on the meatballs and fold in. Continue adding the rest of the meatballs and fold in until they are fully coated. Cook covered, on "low", for 6-8 hours. Crock pot cooking times may vary, and you may have to turn the crock pot down to "keep warm" to avoid boil over. The meatballs are fully cooked right out of the bag, so you only need to be sure they are heated thoroughly. A full bag may be too much for some oval crock pots, so it is up to you on how many you wish to make.

This recipe is for large oval crock pots; adjust ingredients down for smaller quantities or smaller crock pots.

Note: Frozen meatballs are easier to coat without risk of damage.

We want to thank Richard Knoblock for bringing this dish to the Ft. Yargo picnic. We all enjoyed it very much.





This is a 99 page book based on the articles of the same name that appeared in *Turning Wheels* in the early 1990s and which won the SDC's Churchill Award for Best Article, Non-Paid. The book contains all the material from the original series, which ran for a year and a half in *The Hillholder*, and not only replaces some material edited out for the *TW* series, but has updates and several new items that were written after the *TW* series was published.

"Some Thoughts" is aimed at the first-time restorer, but will be of value to the more experienced; it doesn't try to be a "how to restore a car book", but gives you a look at the decision-making processes, tools, spaces and basic skills you'll need to do a restoration, and will provide a framework to help you structure your project.


There are several chapters of Studebaker-specific advice. In the chapter devoted to engine rebuilding, I've tried to describe a step-by-step process that anybody can follow, and I've tried to include tips I've picked up in building 60+ engines. I've received many compliments on the engine chapter, and I'm glad to finally be able to get it in print.

Some Thoughts on Restoring a Studebaker is available for \$22.50 USD, plus \$4 for handling and postage, for a total of \$26.50 to US addresses. Canadian orders add \$6.50 USD for postage, total \$29.00 USD. To order a second book in the same order, add an additional \$3 (\$4 USD for Canadian orders).
